“ I was very sorry to hear of Dennis' death. I first got to know him when I worked on the Alcoholism Treatment Unit at Bethany Medical Center in Kansas City, Kansas. In those days he was relatively new in practice with Stan Golan, and I was impressed with his knowlege of psychiatric disorder and appropriate medication. Later, we worked together at Baptist Medical Center on the Psychiatric Unit as well as the Adolescent Treatment Unit in Kansas City, Missouri. I found him to be an extremely competent psychiatrist as well as a very knowlegable treatment provider for those with dual diagnosis. As a psychologist in private practice practice he became the psychiatrist that I referred all of my clients to who were in need of psychoactive medication. In fact, I referred my own son to him when he needed medication for an incident of anxiety. I always found him to be compassionate and caring when it came to patient care. He was also innovative in regard to the area of medication research developing the concept of groups of people who could work with pharmaceutical companys regarding psychoactive drug research. He was always open to ideas and thoughts regarding psychological and psychiatric issues, a true exception in his field. In the years prior to my retirement we would frequently have lunch together. We would discuss professional issues as well as personal thoughts. He was always proud of his family and enjoyed participatng with them.
